

Move: Indefinite postponement of Article 14.

VOTED: *Indefinite postponement.*

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate or transfer from available funds the sum of \$3,000.00, or any other sum, for the purchase of a plot of land containing approximately two acres more or less situated on Horse Pond Road, Sudbury, from Albert R. Eaton for school site purposes, and that the School Building Committee be authorized to purchase said plot of land; pass any vote or take any action relative thereto.

Submitted by the School Building Committee.

Approved by the Finance Committee.

Finance Committee Report: "We have been informed by the School Building Committee that it is advisable to purchase a certain plot of land containing approximately two acres situated on Horse Pond Road adjacent to the school site. It is the opinion of this committee that the request for \$3,000.00 can be saved in the general appropriation of \$450,000.00 for the construction of the school. If this is correct, then in the appropriation of this \$3,000.00 we are in effect advancing this sum for the purchase of land which will ultimately be refunded when the school construction is completed. The Finance Committee recommends this article."

VOTED: *That the sum of \$3,000.00 be appropriated for the purpose of this article to be expended under the jurisdiction of the School Building Committee with the approval of the Board of Selectmen.*

(Following Article 34, a motion to rescind Article 15 was lost).

Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to create a Permanent Building Committee, the first work of said Committee being to make site surveys of the Haynes Road, Woodside Road, and other sites acquired for school purposes, and to develop plans for an elementary school to be located on one of these sites for occupancy by September 1958, and to appropriate the sum of \$10,000.00 for the use of the Committee. All plans for school buildings shall be subject to the approval of the School Committee. Pass any vote or take any action relative thereto.

Submitted by School Committee.

Finance Committee recommends sum of \$4,000.00.

Finance Committee report: "At the Finance Committee hearings various estimates were made of the amounts required to formulate information to be presented to the townspeople relative to schools and school plans. These estimates varied from \$10,000.00 down to \$1,400.00. It is the recommendation of the Finance Committee that \$4,000.00 be appropriated to make site surveys for school purposes so that the general features of the land can be determined in a number of sites. This is information which is necessary no matter in what order the sites will be used for school construction. We feel that the next site to be developed should be decided upon by the townspeople and at that time further sums should be appropriated for construction plans, but not before the site is chosen."

A motion calling for \$10,000.00 was presented by the School Committee.

AMENDMENT VOTED: *To change "Finance Committee" to "Moderator" to make appointments.*

AMENDMENT VOTED: *To add the words "developed in conjunction with."*

VOTED: *That the Town establish a Permanent Building Committee composed of five members as follows: Three for 3 years, one to be the chairman of the present School Building Committee, one appointed by the Selectmen, one appointed by the Planning Board, and two for terms of 2 years, one appointed by the Moderator, and one appointed by the School Committee. At the expiration of the term of the present School Building Committee Chairman, his place shall be filled by an additional appointee of the Moderator. All subsequent appointments to be for terms of two years. Vacancies on this committee shall be filled by the proper appointing board.*

The duty of this committee shall be to have general supervision over the design and construction of all public buildings, including the authority to employ professional assistance and, subject to specific authorization by the Town, to enter into contracts on behalf of the Town for the preparation of construction plans and specifications and for the construction of buildings and other structures. All such plans and specifications shall be developed in conjunction with and subject to the approval of the appropriate committee, board, or department head concerned.

The first work of said committee shall be to make site surveys of the Haynes Road, Woodside Road, and other sites acquired for school purposes and to develop plans for an elementary school to be located on one of these sites for occupancy by September 1958. The sum of \$10,000 shall

be appropriated for the use of the committee for this purpose.

The following resolution was submitted by Richard A. Maker and was adopted by acclamation:

Be it resolved that the citizens of the Town of Sudbury express their deep appreciation to Kate-Alden G. Hough for her 6 years of earnest and faithful service to the Town of Sudbury as Clerk of the Board of Health.

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to hear and act on the report and recommendations of the so-called "Dump Committee;" take action or pass any votes relative thereto.

REPORT OF THE DUMP COMMITTEE

In carrying out the wishes of the Town relative to the problem of waste disposal, this committee has had valued advice from the State Department of Public Health and three competent sanitary engineers. All of these agencies have viewed sites being considered with members of the committee, and their reports and observations have been of much assistance in finding a solution to this problem.

It would appear from avenues explored by the committee that, whereas the dump situation is critical at the present time it need not throw us into a panic. From observations, some of our citizens have become a bit panicky at the thought of the Town designating certain areas within their midst for the establishment of a dump.

As a result of sentiment expressed at two public hearings and a canvass of the feelings of many people, the committee places the open type of dump in the category of "remote" possibility in Sudbury, and then only if sufficient amount of money is made available to do a better job of operating than has been done in the past.

Three types of disposal were explored as follows: Incineration, Sanitary Land Fill and the open face variety.

Incineration has two types, the permanent and the mobile. The latter type was found to be in the experimental stage and little time was spent with it because none was available.

The permanent type incinerator, which appears to be the most logical and satisfactory method for the future in congested areas, consists of a building — large or small depend-
